Difference between Ethics and Standards



- Principles that guide a person to decide what is good or bad, right or wrong, in a given
- situation.

- Legal Standards
- Standards that are set forth in governmental laws.

- Supportive Decision-making
- Substitute Judgment
- Best Interest Standard

Protect Civil Rights and Liberties

- Appointment Process
- Act as an advocate
- O Protect Privacy
- Right of Association
- Right to Practice Religion

Exhibit highest degree of trust and loyalty

- Treat the ward (conservatee) with dignity.
- O Honesty.
- Listen and show empathy.
- Ascertain the preferences of the ward (conservatee).
- Avoid any conflict of interest.

Residence – Least Restrictive Placement

- Conduct assessment to determine placement.
- Determine the least restrictive placement closest of family and friends.
- Monitor placement and the ward's (conservatee) satisfaction.
- Protect conservatee rom physical harm or abuse.

Consent to care, treatment and services

- Determine the ward (conservatee's) preference for care.
- Consent to medical treatment considering the least restrictive intervention.
- Include family when making end-of-life decisions.

Management of Estate

- Comply with local, state and federal laws.
- Avoid conflict of interest or self-dealing.
- Protect the assets of the estate.
- Exhibit competence in your duties.
- Fees are reasonable.

Termination and Limitation of Guardianship

- Promote independence.
- If appropriate terminate the guardianship (conservatorship)
- Seek limitation of the guardian's, (conservator's) powers when appropriate.

Breach of Duty

- Breaching a Duty is cause for removal or surcharge.
- Failure to use ordinary care and diligence.
- Failure to perform duties.
- Conviction of a felony.
- Gross immorality.
- Insolvency or bankruptcy of guardian (conservator).
